BLAZE KINDLES LOCAL CONCERN

East Claremont St Fire



A serious fire has damaged the interior of the Town House B&B at 53 East Claremont Street.

The blaze broke out in the basement at around 6pm on 22nd May and within minutes 6 pumping appliances were on the scene at the listed building. Teams of firefighters wearing breathing equipment searched the smoke-filled basement and 3-storeys for people trapped inside. Fortunately it emerged that the building was empty and there were no casualties. The fire was under control by 9.40pm, although a tender remained overnight in case of reignition.

At the height of the incident, up to 11 fire-brigade vehicles and 45 personnel were in attendance, along with two ambulances and two police cars. Dozens of local residents, - some of whom had anxiously left adjacent properties - , watched as windows were smashed to let out the smoke. Thermal imaging equipment was deployed from a crane to check that fire had not spread under the roof.

Local resident Alexander McIntosh (11) commented: 'It was absolutely brilliant. We may have to wait years before something this exciting happens again.'

David Mallin, a spokesman for Lothian & Borders Fire Brigade, said that the cause of the blaze was not yet known, but fire investigators were treating it as 'suspicious'. Ten properties on the north side of the street remained cordoned off the next day as piles of burnt debris were cleared from the building and forensic experts began their work.

The Town House appears on the Internet as a 9-bedroom backpacker hostel/ B&B, with a sauna, steamroom, jacuzzi and gym, but this is not the first time the 1820s premises have been in the news. Until recently a swingers' club was housed in the building and before that a gay sauna operated there. Locals had earlier voiced concerns about the site being used as a brothel. In the mid-1990s a health club was at No. 53, with its mannequin vaulting over the railings outside a source of irritation or amusement to neighbours.

Broughton's New Councillors

Broughton residents are split between two wards. You are in City Centre Ward if you live in East London Street, Broughton Place, Hart/Forth/Union Streets, Picardy Place, Gayfield, the main road up through Rodney Street and Broughton Street, and anywhere west from there. CITY CENTRE WARD



David Beckett (SNP)

Priorities: (1) Glenogle Baths enables residents of Broughton and the New Town to exercise locally in a historic building that must be refurbished, not demolished; (2) a reliable and regular bus service for residents of Broughton. By investing in Edinburgh's buses we can deliver a greener, improved public transport system that encourages more people to use public transport, something which the tram proposals do not address; (3) to help local businesses I would investigate the possibility of including Broughton in a Business Improvement District (BID).

Charles Dundas (LibDem)

Priorities: (1) maintain and build upon the close relationship between residents and local businesses in Broughton through sympathetic consideration of planning and licensing matters and an ongoing consultative and listening attitude towards all parties; (2) preserve our green spaces such as Calton Hill and develop them for better public use; (3) ensure that every voter will be able to feed into the decisions made by Council in a far more democratic way.

Joanna Mowat (Conservative)

Priorities: (1) roads and pavements are brought up to an acceptable standard and then regularly maintained, in addition a regular schedule of street and gully cleaning should be reinstated and where necessary the Council should employ someone with a brush and a barrow for hard to reach areas; (2) guardianship of the World Heritage Site to ensure that development in Edinburgh is appropriate and does not detract or overwhelm her historic buildings; (3) value for money for Council Tax payers and as low a council tax as possible.

LEITH WALK WARD



Angela Blacklock (Labour)

Priorities: (1) More affordable housing in particular as we currently have a very high rate of housing deprivation in the ward; (2) improving local schools – Drummond High School in particular would benefit from improvements, but we need a clear strategy for primary schools as school rolls continue to fall; (3) the local community – I will value and work with community groups, work to set these up where there are none and try to form a network across the ward. I think that this is important for Leith Walk ward especially when we have such a transient population, often people coming from other countries and also with the loss of the Calton Centre.



With the physical regeneration of the building, these important bodies will themselves have a higher profile than before and be more accessible to the general public. The Glasite Meeting House Committee, headed by Peter Burnam, anticipates that “the building will also be available as a venue during the Edinburgh International Festival, and for other appropriate cultural or social purposes throughout the year”. This is wonderful news for Broughton which has been sadly deprived of a truly cultural centrepiece for some years, and which the teeming cosmopolitan ‘village’ so richly deserves.

Phase 1 of the renovation work on the street facade of the building has just been completed. Work will continue on the back, and the remarkable interior (highlighted in April’s issue). In the nature of things, buildings rise and fall, metamorphose, and are in the happiest circumstance, rejuvenated. Thanks to institutions such as the World Heritage Trust and the Cockburn Association, and the vigilance of local community associations, Broughton is particularly rich in its most venerable buildings. They are preserved with care and have also reinvented themselves to embrace the future with confidence and a certain panache, which echoes the ethos of the original architects of the New Town.

Previous *Spurtle* articles highlighted several of Broughton’s early 19th-

century buildings which now comprise the Mansfield Centre, the Stafford Centre, the Lyon and Turnbull building, the National Assay Office, and the ‘Media Centre’ building. All are gems in Broughton’s tiara. The April issue referred to the history of the other largely unnoticed jewels in this strand – the Glasite Meeting House in Barony Street. This, too, will soon shine forth after many years of painstaking renovation of its external structure.

Currently, the building is the national headquarters of the Architectural Heritage Society of Scotland who now own it. The Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings in Scotland,
