City of Edinburgh Council's Katie Swann wants to reinvigorate the 9-year-old City Centre Neighbourhood Partnership (CCNP).

She seeks more equal and active participation from local councillors, community councils, police, businesses, the NHS, the Edinburgh Voluntary Organisations Council, and residents.

She aims for a cleaner/greener city, and to improve active travel, local democracy, local arts for local people, and people's sense of personal safety.

Some sceptics claim the CCNP lacks teeth compared to the overweening

Essential Edinburgh, but still hope it will champion public input on how St Andrew Square and Calton Hill are managed in future.

OVERSIZED EYESORE IRKS

As Spurtle prepared to go to press, we were alerted to this horrible great lump (see website 26.3.15).

A Brentford-based firm hopes to install the 9ft+ giant on the pavement outside 71 George Street, where it would beam adverts at passersby in two directions.

We dislike it because it's a potential eyesore more suited to Brentford than a UNESCO World Heritage Site. We also think it would be a potentially dangerous distraction for pedestrians

and road users alike close to a busy junction.

This is the latest in a series of speculative planning applications for visually intrusive advertising platforms in the city centre. The commercial pressure is mounting. We urge readers who oppose these intrusions to contact their councillors and tell them so.

GREEN WASTE, RED FACES

Landfill and trial-recycling waste collection in Claremont and Bellevue have been marred by missed and mistaken collections in recent weeks.

The Council's biggest embarrassment came when the New Town Clean Streets Campaign witnessed landfill and recycling being tipped into the same lorry on 13 March. Workers said they were unaware of the local trial, and doubted whether enough vehicles existed to run it properly in any case (see our website 16.3.15)



A CEC spokesperson later dismissed the incident as a limited and unrepresentative mistake. Environment Convener Cllr Leslie Hinds, who in February rapped Spurtle correspondents' knuckles for voicing doubts about the scheme, was invited to comment but did not.

Bellevue residents are no angels. NTCSC's investigations show locals keep putting the wrong rubbish in recycling bins, and bagging the right kind of rubbish when it should go in loose.

April's **New Town & Broughton Community Council** (NTBCC) meeting is for members only. **Leith Central Community Council** will meet in public as usual, at 7pm in **McDonald Rd Library** at on Mon 20 Apr.

Young poet and former Albany St resident **Adam Bojelian** died on 24 March. Born with cerebral palsy, Bojelian communicated by blinking, and went on to build a **worldwide audience** for his creative work online. His **courage, tenacity and cheerfulness** inspired many. Boundary Commission proposals for Edinburgh wards were announced on 19 Mar. Consultation with the City of Edinburgh Council will run until mid-May, and CEC will produce detailed maps. A 12-week public consultation will start in July.

In recent months we have mentioned a **spate of break-ins** at local businesses. Official figures now confirm that trend. At last month's NTBCC meeting, police reported **10 break-ins or attempted burglaries** during Feb in the area north of Princes St. Mostly, it was small independents which were targeted, **usually via the front door**. A further 2 had occurred by 9 Mar. Meanwhile, theft from cars is popular in Leith. Around **20 smash- and-grabs** have occurred per week lately, most at night.

Concerns have been raised that a wall between **Pilrig Park and the adjacent primary school** is unstable. CEC is aware. Meanwhile, Friends of the Park have defended a vigorous approach to **cutting back undergrowth**. They deny wildlife has been affected, and say locals appreciate a reduction in turds, condoms and nuisance elders.

on Calton Hill from 25 April–12 July. It is 'a multi-channel audio installation featuring a newly commissioned audio track in Scottish Gaelic, translated and read by poet Aonghas MacNeacail. This will be played alongside the original Uighur text, which offers advice on the power and pitfalls of the tongue, and translations into Turkish, German, Polish, and Arabic. Drawing on the "Gavrilov" voice-over technique, the work will create a disruptive experience, touching on issues of legibility and authenticity.' Sounds like a scream.

It's clean, it's fresh, it's boring



The Howe Street branch of Margiotta's has shut after 20+ years, with managers blaming the wrong size of premises which didn't allow for sufficient chiller space. A plausible alternative reading is that any small supermarket hereabouts needs chiller space to match that over the road at Sainsbury's (see our website 5.3.15).

Few independents can withstand the multiples' drive to establish local retail monocultures. However, *Spurtle* hears encouraging rumours from elsewhere in the barony. Watch this space.

Gretna Disaster recalled

Persevere, a new play marking the Gretna (Quintinshill) Train Disaster and its effect on Edinburgh communities will be performed at the Dalmeny Street Drill Hall on 22 May, exactly 100 years after the tragedy occurred.

It has been devised by a group of local actors from Strange Town Young Company and Active Inquiry. The performance will be a promenade experience, using the Drill Hall as the backdrop and original setting to the story. Many of the 226 dead were brought here for identification.

Persevere is part of Out of the Blue's Gretna 100 project, funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund, and is one of a series of events and projects marking the anniversary. For further information contact Megan Davies meg@outoftheblue.org.uk (Tel. 555 7131).

Drummond kids brighten up St Mary's

This brilliant mural is one of an Edinburgh-themed series painted early last month beside the stairs in Broughton St Mary's Parish Church.

They were created by 22 pupils from Drummond CHS and Leith Academy, who planned and budgeted the job, then worked against the clock to complete it in a 24-hour challenge as part of their SkillForce Prince's Award.

Instructor Hannah Smith said afterwards, 'It's important that young people feel they are part of the community and are given the opportunity to make their own contribution. I'm extremely proud of all they've done throughout the year, and for the hard work, time and effort they put into this project'.

Successful participants will receive records of achievement in a ceremony at Tynecastle High School later this year.



From Glenorchy to Glasshouse: Part 2

This John Ruskin pencil drawing of 1838 (now in Birmingham Museums & Art Gallery), was long held to depict Lady Glenorchy's Church (see Issue 238). It is in fact of Trinity College Kirk in the valley between the Old Town and Calton Hill on the west side of Leith Wynd.

Contemporary pictures suggest a building of robust splendour which would have appealed to Ruskin. Although only 19 when he drew this image during a tour of Scotland with his parents, he was already a highly accomplished draughtsman.

The building had been established by Queen Mary of Gueldres in memory of her husband King James II in 1460, and functioned as a grand parish church from c.1580–1848. It was then dismantled to make way for Waverley Station, with

masonry being carefully numbered to aid reconstruction later.

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One transept and the choir were rebuilt in the 1870s between Chalmer's Close and Trunk's Close off the Royal Mile. Here it has more recently functioned as a brass-rubbing centre and Fringe venue.— *JRM* [For more on this intriguing structure, see the website (2.4.15).]

Bansky coming to Broughton

Banksy will come to Broughton this month when a new 'Street Art' Gallery opens on Picardy Place.

It's the brainchild of The Street Bar part-owner 'Trendy Wendy', whose interest in the genre began during her years as a self-confessed fly-poster.

The opening exhibition will include hand-pulled screenprints and stencil work, and framed limited edition and signed works. Everything is for sale.

Obviously, the pieces have come indoors and gone upmarket, but all

the works on show will have had their origins on the street. It includes work by Banksy, Eddie Colla, Death NYC, Shepherd Fairey, Keith Haring, Hutch, Mr Brainwash, Static and Stik. For more, see: www.thestreetartgallery.co.uk

Meanwhile, for those who can't wait, the Rodney Street Tunnel has an intriguing new resident (see above). *Spurtle's* Rhys Fullerton spotted him in early March, and reader Matthew Roy recognised the mark in the middle of the forehead as a Buddhist om symbol. Several readers have suggested he may be inspired by characters in the Hayao Miyazaki animation *Spirited Away*.

Bird-brained April: long-tailed tits

These small, sociable, piebald birds are at their busiest now. As early nesters they will already have eggs and maybe chicks. How do they manage it? Insulation and teamwork. Long-tailed tits build a beautiful moss and spider's web sphere lined with wool and feathers. Both parents parent, and are reportedly supported by other adults who have failed to mate and have time to spare.

How to see them: They're rarely seen alone and stick together using a high-pitched syrup or tsi, tsi, tsi. They can be seen anywhere, foraging through bushes and hedges. They are distinctive, with contrasting plumage and a tail that looks about twice as long as the bird itself.

See also: the pink hue to their feathers. Keep an eye open as well for the lookalike, confident and very horizontal pied wagtail, strutting around in open areas, parks and by the river. These birds are of a similar size and colouring, and have a long tail, but are seen in more open areas. At this time of year they are usually alone. — Miles Forde

Locals have been baffled and exasperated by yet another planning application to convert the **E. Scotland St Lane 'garage'** into an 'office' (Ref. 15/00700/FUL). CEC Planners declined to determine the last effort as it was no different to the one **before**, which they had previously rejected. Despite this latest version being materially no different to either of the other two, it is being considered. Confused? So are Council Planning staff who responded to locals' enquiries with puzzled expressions and clouds of octopus ink. New Town & Broughton Community Council has promised to object by the 3 Apr deadline.

A 24-year-old French tourist was robbed at knifepoint on Sat 8 March. Two white men in their 30s stole his laptop, mobile and wallet on the corner of Dublin St and Broughton Market at about 8pm.


