

The Botanics connection

After several years of hard work, things are really coming together in the public garden in Hopetoun Crescent. Each

spring there's now an explosion of colour, thanks to daffodil and snowdrop bulbs planted by the City's

Parks Department and children from local primary schools. Last month we reported the arrival of a fairy circle of

giant mushrooms. Now a colourful Information Panelhas been installed, explaining the history of the garden and describing what visitors can find in it today.

The panel was unveiled by the Regius Keeper of the Royal Botanic Garden on 24th November. He also planted botanical specimens appropriate to the garden's history. That history goes

back to 1763, when a Botanic Garden was opened off Leith Walk – covering an area of five acres that includes what is now Hopetoun Crescent Garden; it remained here until the move down to Inverleith in 1822.

The historical connection with the Botanics has been-further emphasised by labelling of trees at Hopetoun in the same style used at Inverleith. All this has been achieved through the vision and determination of the Friends of Hopetoun Crescent Garden, coupled with enthusiastic support from the Royal Botanic Garden, the City Council, and Four Winds Inspiration Centre – who created those magic mushrooms.

Irene Fekete of Claremont Court died on 20th November, after a struggle against cancer of the pancreas.

Irene was born in the USA of

Hungarian parents. She taught in Greece, and then in England, before working in publishing for John Murray, The Schools Council, Hutchinson and then the British Museum-editing their series of books

She retired to Edinburgh, having been at the University here in her student days and loved the city. Here she led a busy life through her Roman Catholic and Greek Orthodox contacts, and with Women in Black. And she published a book of poems and two thrillers.

In Broughton she'll be remembered as a determined champion of the interests of Claremont Court residents: 'Claremont Court now being a listed building, and all the work that was carried out there, are testaments to her very special dedication and tenacity', Yvonne Pryor of Bellevue and Claremont Residents Association told **Spurtle**. Irene was also an active member of New Town, Broughton and Pilrig Community Council, whose secretary Annette O'Carroll sent us this tribute:

'She was a very valued member of the Community Council. I greatly admiredher fighting spirit, particularly when faced with a terminal diagnosis. She was incredibly brave and an inspiration to us all.'

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CIVIL PARTNERSHIP Step forwards for civil rights

On 18th November 2004, the UK Civil Partnership Bill was given Royal Assent and became the law of the land. Because it passed at about

the same time as a bill against hunting, it got little remarkably publicity, and what there was, seemed a little confused.

What it means for you and me and the lesbian couple down the road is that, probably in autumn 2005, lesbian, gay,

and bisexual people will have access to the same civil rights of marriage that straight people take for granted. Two women or two men who enter into civil partnership with each other will have almost the same legal rights and obligations towards each other as a woman and a man who enter into civil marriage with each other. (The main exception in Scotland is with regard to adoption: while English/ Welsh adoption law was reformed in 2002, the Scottish Parliament's Family Law bill won't pass until 2005.)

We need a verb for civil partnership: I realised this when I found myself

Jane Carnall, Information Worker at writing about how Wanda's girlfriend from Australia would now be able to come to the UK, "civil-partner" her girlfriend, and have the right to live and work in the UK. It isn't marriage

- the Civil Partnership Act does not grant the right of same-sex

couples to marry each other.

Marriage is many things to many people: but in civil law, a marriage is a means of packaging up a whole lot of rights in one convenient bundle to be carried by you and by the

person with whom you have chosen to share your life. (For example: the right to share your pension, to benefit by insurance, to have immigration rights, to be your partner's next-of-kin, to inherit shared property without paying 40% inheritance tax - none of them rights conveyed by cohabiting, no matter how long you've done it.) Civil partnership's bundle of rights is virtually identical to civil marriage.

BROUGHTON STREET ROUNDABOUT Radical solution?

Last month David Sterratt of Bellevue Road welcomed general consensus that red cycle lanes should not be restored on the Broughton Street roundabout. He went on to urge replacement of the roundabout itself by traffic lights with pedestrian crossings at the crossroads. Peter **Verity** of Scotland Street agrees:

The roundabout is most unpleasant for cyclists, pedestrians crossing and just passers-by. Various parts of Edinburgh have had traffic calming,

with pedestrians given priority: here, however, the traffic is fed through the roundabout at high speed, pedestrians are expected to deviate 20 or 30 metres to get past the roundabout ... past protective railings ... sauna visitors and shoppers parked on the zigzag lines before the pedestrian crossing lights.

Traffic lights would be a huge improvement! And it could actually become a fairly pleasant space too -'Broughton Plaza'?

MESSAGE FROM MCDONALD ROAD FIRE STATION Celebrate safely

Firefighter Steven Latimer of Green Watch, McDonald Road Fire Station advises:

- On the 1st day of Christmas Check your Christmas tree lights conform to the British Standard.
- On the 2nd day Never place candles near your Christmas tree or furnishings. Don't leave them burning unattended.
- On the 3rd day Make sure your family and guests know what to do in an emergency. Make a fire escape plan.
- On the 4th day Decorations can burn easily. Don't attach them to lights or heaters.
- On the 5th day Never overload electrical sockets.
- On the 6th day Most fires start in the kitchen. Never leave a cooker unattended.
- On the 7th day Celebrate Christmas and New Year safely. The risk of accidents, especially in the kitchen, is greater after alcohol is consumed.

- On the 8th day If you are planning to celebrate with fireworks, store them in a metal box, read the instructions, never go back to a lit firework and keep a bucket of water nearby.
- On the 9th day Make sure you have a working smoke alarm.
- On the 10th day Check the battery in your smoke alarm every week and use Christmas as a reminder to clean it and remove dust.
- On the 11th day Make sure candles and cigarettes are completely extinguished before going to bed. Keep matches and lighters away from children.
- On the 12th day Take a second to check on elderly relatives and neighbours this Christmas. Make sure they are fire safe.

EAST CLAREMONT STREET Parking nonsense

When the crossing-points on East Claremont Street first appeared many drivers just parked regardless, blocking

the crossings. So the City Council painted advisory white lines, hoping everyone would get the message and leave the crossings clear. That wasn't enough for some drivers, so in response to local demand the Council put in enforceable yellow lines instead. But the problem's creeping back again: not just on or near the

crossings, but also in the centre of the street.

Councillor Trevor Davies tells us that the Council will now add a

bollard to the traffic island, and replace a broken one. They'll also paint white hatching lines in the



centre of the street to discourage parking there. But 'it may take a little time for those measures to be put in place'.
