Alan McIntosh, Chair of Broughton Primary School Board, reports:


Representatives of the police, pupils, staff, parents and Council joined an assembly at Broughton Primary on 20th January to launch their School Travel Plan. This document draws on surveys and local knowledge to show how the community will work together to encourage healthy travel options, and improve safety, for children going to and from the school.

The Plan favours walking, cycling and public transport. It is not anti-car, but does seek ways to reduce unnecessary or dangerous car use, and encourages active choices. It involves the school curriculum and out-of-school initiatives, and also highlights problems identified in recent questionnaires which are barriers to active school travel choices. Some of these are problems with the route itself, and will be submitted to the council engineering department to assess the possibility of engineering solutions.


The Plan is in tune with the school's commitment to work with parents to provide a welcoming, safe and caring environment. It also dovetails with the school's wider priority to become a health-promoting school. Throughout, we've tried to establish the facts and then set ourselves realistic and measurable goals.

The Plan is part of the Scottish Executive and City of Edinburgh Council's Safer Routes to School campaign, and is supported by staff, the School Board and the Parents-Staff Association. It is also endorsed by Councillor Trevor Davies and the New Town, Broughton and Pilrig Community Council.

LOCAL COMMUNITY SHOPS


'A triumph of sheer hard work'

Last edition we championed local shops against invader Tesco Express. **Spurtle's Ross MacLean** starts a survey of what's on offer:

Despite traffic frenzy, hydraheaded superstores and the recent loss of four well-loved facilities (the Sundial launderette, the Post Office, Broughton Books and Alastair's D.I.Y.), one of the unique charms of Broughton is its village identity and the diversity of its traders. Its multiplicity of small shops, in particular, thrive against the odds, and accentuate the open, tolerant and cosmopolitan character of the area.


This series will profile just some of Broughton's remarkable emporia, and is a salute to all the traders and workers who contribute so much to our vibrant community.

MR AKRAM'S NEWSAGENCY at No.28 is a triumph of enterprise and sheer hard work. The current business was established by Mr Akram's uncle in 1984, and was inherited by his nephew ten years later. Single-handedly, over the years Mr Akram has greatly expanded and streamlined a once modest business into a flourishing, multi-layered facility. He continues to open the shop at 5.30am, and it remains open until 6 or 7pm from Monday to Saturday. In addition to the newsagency, the shop also purveys general grocery, stationery, and is now a PayPoint retailer where one can pay over 400 utility and service companies. These include gas, electricity, phone, water, TV licence, power cards, rent, bus



tickets, council tax, mail order and much more. There is also a fax/ photocopy service.

common with of In many Broughton's shops run by Asian Scots, this highly professional establishment has the charm of a village corner shop whose customers seem part of an extended family, and time is not of the essence. Mr Akram presides over all this with a calm geniality, so that the ambience is always convivial, never pressurised, which is perhaps more than can be said of most superstores. 'When do you sleep?', I asked. 'Och', he-said with a twinkle, 'I fit that in too!'

The word from the City Council was that for legal reasons it would not be possible to re-open other closures west of Broughton Street for another 18 months. But lo and behold, as we write work to re-open at Albany Street/Dublin Street is underway!

Months ago we were reporting on local opposition to plans for a 3storey block of flats on the wee car park in **Broughton Street Lane**. Now the story is coming to a head: planning officials have recommended acceptance of a modified plan, but local residents are still up in arms; so the planning committee were making a site visit on 2nd February (after we went to print); and decision day is the 8th.




