CHAPMAN MAGAZINE, BROUGHTON PLACE Rebus and Russian poems

We asked two local residents to choose something in the current edition of literary magazine *Chapman* to write about.



John Ross MacLean chose some Russian poems:

Scottish letters uphold а distinguished, yet often unsung, reputation for the work of its translators, at the highest level. Scott Moncrieff, George Campbell Hay and David Mcduff spring to mind. Belinda Cooke's translations of Marina Tsvetaeva's poetry are a thrilling confirmation that this most challenging aspect of literature retains its high place within Chapman.

I read them with the sort of fierce intensity which equally accorded to Tsvetaeva's heroic compatriots Akhmatova, Mandelstam and Pasternak, and to her sublime successor Irina Ratushinskyaya. appalling The death, last month, of Anna Politkovskaya reminds us that the courageous voices of these great Russian poets are as relevant in the 21st century, as they were in the 20th.

Not for the first time, *Chapman* and its indefatigable and inspiring editor Joy Hendry, are to be congratulated for accentuating the cause of poetry both within and beyond the land of the little white rose.



Eileen Dickie is a detective f i c t i o n enthusiast :

This is the first time that I have sat down and seriously read *Chapman* magazine. And I was very impressed - by the range of subjects, by the range of authors and by the sheer 'readability' of most of the contents. T wholeheartedly agree with the editorial re the chasm between popular and 'quality' literature (and art) and this is a subject worth pursuing. Aficionados of crime/ detective fiction do feel a slight frisson of embarrassment when admitting to reading this particular genre -- even novels by authors such as Ian Rankin and Val McDermid. I am certainly looking forward to reading the whole of Rankin's novel The Naming of the *Dead* – my appetite was well and truly whetted by the taster chapter. I have known about Chapman for many years but somehow never sat down and really found out what it was all about. Lang may yer lum reek.

After visits to Gorgie Farm and getting experience from the Broughton

Road play ground and help from a wonderful local artist, we now have really exciting plans to aim for: there's space for a small wildflower meadow, lots of playground equipment, an arbour shelter and beautiful flower beds. We are excited about where we've got to, and the City Council is fully behind us.

The biggest job is now ahead of us – raising money and getting time commitments. The Council may help with up to a third of the money and so the BVA and its friends need to make up the difference. Anyone who has any ideas on local companies that may like to help will be welcomed.
