### FORTH STREET AND BROUGHTON STREET LANE **Outlook uncertain**

**Spurtle** reported on the problems experienced by households on Forth Street whose windows and gardens back on to Broughton Street Lane. Then, it was the hotel development looming over the other side of this narrow lane that threatened their dayto-day amenity. They made the point that city-centre family living, instead of being encouraged, seemed constantly under threat from commercial interests hungry to develop every scrap of space in the area. By their own efforts, an accommodation was reached. The outlook seemed good.

Now, if a proposal for even more building goes ahead, their outlook will be onto a three-storey, twelve-flat development intended for the open space presently used as a commercial car park. And the site plan actually seems to include the ground occupied by their own back gardens! This is particularly significant for basement dweller Janice Donaldson and her daughter, residents for 14 years, but

It was as recently as March that they and all their neighbours are sorely worried that even the City Council's own guidelines on Daylighting, Sunlight and Privacy will be breached. They are also questioning the regulations on the minimum distances there must be between adjoining structures. Plans also include an underground car park with unexplained implications for access; and a barbecue area that would be invasive to surrounding properties.

> Residents are not unaware of the pressures for change. But this they see as "a huge over-development" of a very small site, originally a mews lane the proportions of which should be restored. It also makes no provision for – and is likely to degrade – open spaces, greenery and the other factors that make for an acceptable quality of life. Not to mention the displacement of vehicles using the existing car park which doubtless will be crammed into ever reducing space elsewhere.

The Council knows that feelings are running high – their answers are awaited.
