

Last month we reported residents squaring up for a fight with the Palladium - the Festival venue in the



former Broughton Place church. Their opposition sprang from memories of noise and disruption two years ago; but since then major improvements have been made to the venue soundproofing, adequate toilets inside the building, and a new internal entrance to the hall under the church to cut out movement and noise round the back of the building. So now that this year's Festival has run its course, what's the verdict?

The pub just round the corner in Broughton Street is a watering- hole for both local residents and folk from the Palladium. The venue didn't seem to feature as an issue for discussion at all. So Spurtle knocked at doors in Broughton Place itself. "I've been woken up in the middle of the night quite constantly", Lynn Letham told us.
