Cash boost for library

capital programme looks set to be a toilets and baby-changing space now real boost for McDonald Road Library. **Spurtle** spoke to Librarians Jim Thompson and Ewan McCormick just as they were preparing a formal report

The promise of a one-off £200,000 will spark off the upgrading of the Library building and the services provided. The cash, though welcome, is not enough to make everything possible. But it does put in place an initial 2-year programme to identify what best use to make of the funds. with the aim of long-term and significant improvement.

High on the list of priorities is accessibility, and freeing-up space to be put to better use – a lift looms large

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Additional funding from the City's (and expensive!). More basically, comes standard - but not here, yet. And before any of this can be contemplated - roof repairs are essential.

Little of this will be achievable for the Hopetoun Steering Committee. without attracting additional funding from sources outwith the Council. This could be by Lottery grants or by bringing onboard private enterprises who also have a stake in the neighbourhood. The first year of the programme will be taken up with consultation and planning. By year two the first effects should be seen.

As part of the plan is to make the Library much more of a focus for the community rapidly expanding around it, it is intended to consult local people - so watch this space.

Good news on traffic



July brought good news for road users in Edinburgh, particularly pedestrians. First came the official announcement Committee, Mark Lazarowicz, is also our that the City Council is determined to press ahead as quickly as possible with around 300 traffic-calming schemes, pedestrian crossings and 20mph zones. Only a fraction of the money is available at the moment, but the Council will give high priority to finding the rest.

Then came a leaked draft report outlining the Council's long-term strategy. In future all decisions on allocating road space should honour clearcut priorities given to different groups of road users:

"Within the context of this hierarchy of road users which places pedestrians, cyclists and bus users at the top and car commuters at the bottom, the Council will make a presumption in favour of reallocating road space away from moving and parked cars and towards more sustainable modes of transport."

The howls of "anti-car!" were predictable. But it's more a case of redressing the balance: Edinburgh's streets have been organised around the demands of the car for far too long. We hope the Council has the political will to stick to those good intentions and find the money to put them into practice.

Local progress

The convenor of the City's Transport local councillor. Spurtle asked him for recent progress on Broughton issues:

 Europcar in East London Street have been sent a letter pointing out that it's a criminal offence to block the pedestrian way. After a short-lived improvement, they're back to their old ways; a Council official is due to discuss

enforcement with the police.

- The traffic island for Broughton Street is "likely to go ahead in the current financial year".
- Double yellow lines for some of the East Claremont Street humps; double yellow lines from the opening to Huntingdon Place to the health centre; and lines in East London Street to stop parking at the bus stop and approach to the crossing - all due to come up at the Transport Committee in August or September.

In last month's **Spurtle**, Simon Challoner of East Claremont Street floated the idea of blocking off the street at the Broughton Primary School end. Since then local residents with children have told him they welcome the idea, particularly because it would cut down the traffic around the school.

Alice Lauder of Bellevue Gardens wrote to wish him luck in his plans to curb the traffic in our area. But: "Where would the displaced traffic go? Would it disappear because it could not be bothered with all the route changes? This is possible because, as I use these streets every day, I feel that there is not so much traffic in Annandale Street now because of the speed bumps". Or will the traffic be dispersed into other less suitable streets? 'Your suggestion would have to be investigated thoroughly."

Redbraes struggles on

Redbraes residents' petition about their neglected local park is on its way to our local councillor. Meanwhile, Ann Donohoe of Redbraes Place tells Spurtle they haven't cracked the street cleaning problem yet. They get some service by phoning Rapid Response, but the regular "once a week" clean the Council quotes just doesn't seem to happen. It makes her wonder if Rapid Response has only been made possible by taking staff and vehicles off regular routes.

After trying several avenues, Ann got action on their street drains by phoning CLARENCE. But the Giant Hogweed in their back greens is now 14 feet high: she suspects the lack of action on this could be due to a dispute over responsibility between the Parks and Housing Departments.
