

First questions to new councillor



Not much more than a fifth of us on the electoral register turned out to vote for a new Broughton councillor on 11th October. Apathy - or a justified belief that it wouldn't make much difference who won?

Trevor Davies held the seat for Labour. In an election leaflet he promised to work to make Broughton "a safer and cleaner place in which to live and work". On making the area cleaner, we asked him three questions.

Is it true that the number of staff actually cleaning Edinburgh streets has fallen by 20% over the past 4 years (as claimed in the mainstream local Press)? Councillor Davies sent us figures which suggest a drop between 1997 and 2000, but nothing like 20%, and a substantial increase for 2000-1. But beware statistics, and the need to compare like with like: "the increase in the current year is partly accounted for by integrating ground maintenance and other cleaning roles into general street
