CHANGES MAY CURB CHRONIC 'PARTY FLAT' NUISANCES

New conditions on landlords of problem 'party flats' are likely to be introduced this year.

Many locals have experienced disruption from nearby properties – particularly from short-term holiday lets in tenements – which attract noisy sports fans, stag/hen parties, and self-confident, young thespians with no volume control. Officials within the Scottish Government's Housing and Communities Department have now drafted a Scottish Statutory Instrument which would allow anti-social behaviour notices (ASBNs) to be served on landlords and their tenants.

The City of Edinburgh Council (CEC) has been 'generally supportive' of the move, and could serve ASBNs which, for example, limit how many people can be in a property at one time, or require the presence of staff. Failure to comply with an ASBN's terms could result in prosecution.

The development emerged in correspondence last month between Housing Minister Alex Neil and Lothians MSP Shirley-Anne Somerville (*Extras* 1.2.11). Ms Somerville welcomed this cooperative initiative, and the fact that it could be passed before Parliament breaks up for the election in May. But she struck a note of caution, saying '... we can't be complacent, and careful monitoring of the situation will be required to assess whether these changes are enough – or whether we need to go further in due course'.

Spurtle also welcomes the changes whilst doubting their effectiveness. The root problem remains businesses directing many party-minded people to non-party-minded residential contexts.

LOCAL TOURISM DIVIDEND LIKELY AFTER OSCAR NOMINATION



The Illusionist, which has specific local connections (Issues 180-1), was one of 5 animated feature films nominated for a Golden Globe in November. Sadly, it lost out to Hollywood behemoth *Toy Story III*.

However, it is one of only 3 films in its category nominated for an Academy Award (Oscar) on 28 February. This is an immense achievement by the (formerly) George St-based animators who socialised extensively in Broughton. It should also result in wider distribution in the US and, potentially, enhanced tourism benefits for Edinburgh. A DVD of the film will be released in the UK on 14 February.

BROUGHTON HALLS REVIVED



Since 1853, the splendid building now known as Broughton Halls at 32a Broughton Street has been a school, a church, a Rifleman's Lodge, a Festival theatre venue, and a nightclub.

After 158 years, it has metamorphosed again into a 6-apartment residence, and a most welcome addition to the 21st-century 'village'. Internal alterations and fine exterior renovation have been effected by Morgan-McDonnell Architecture Ltd. The Scots Jacobean-styled building and its fascinating details have been carefully preserved. There is a sympathetic dormer extension to the roof, but the most radical external change is a new doorway.

Opinions may differ on the latter. Suggestive of Piet Mondrian's linear style, in *Spurtle's* view this is an exciting addition to Broughton's built joie-de-vivre.

FLOOD DEFENCES NEARER

Phase 1 of the Water of Leith flood prevention measures is expected to begin in March, and will focus on Newhaven Road, and Bonnington to Deanhaugh Street. (See *Breaking news* 9.11.10 for links to plans.)

Changes in the way the Scottish Government disburses funds have delayed the project, but CEC has now appointed contractors to carry out the work.

Lagan Construction, an Irish firm, won the job with the lowest of five applications (£11.5m). The work is estimated to take until December 2012.

However, in light of the trams fiasco, sceptics wonder whether the lowest bid will eventually represent the best value for money.

Social media explained

Twenty-first-century tools like blogs, podcasts, video and social networks can give a real boost to all sorts of organisations, often for little or no cost. However, learning to use them daunts many people.

That's why expert volunteers with backgrounds in journalism, business, technology and PR are now showing locals involved in charities and community groups how to make best use of social media for free.

Bellevue news and blues



We reported last year on the shoddy, mixer-maxter 'repair' of Bellevue Crescent's fissured pavements (Issue 180).

During the recent glacial interlude, their ungritted surfaces were negotiated only by the intrepid or foolhardy. When

the ice finally melted away, many of the old cracks reappeared and further repair is clearly required. On one section, we counted 15 trip hazards within 30 yards.

The Crescent is one of the UNESCO World Heritage Site's jewels. Its pavements are anything but. This applies to many other streets in the New Town. Why is their repair and upkeep of seemingly least consideration in maintaining and consolidating the capital's prize asset?

More positively, the risible pavements between the Crescent's 'island' parks and the Bellevue thoroughfare are now being widened and should be significantly more pedestrian-friendly in the near future.

Broughton birds observed

Broughton participants in the RSPB's Back Garden Bird Watch (29-30 January) reported mixed results on Twitter.

After one hour's observation, some boasted 15 species and extravagant flocks of goldfinch (Cochran Terrace). Others, in more Arctic E. Claremont Street and elsewhere observed absolutely nothing.

Profile: General Kazimierz Dworak (1895–1954)

A commemorative plaque at No. 109 Great King Street records this as a residence of General Kazimierz Dworak of the Polish Brigade.

Born on 7 January 1895 in Rzeszow, Poland, he went on to become a leading (and much decorated) specialist in the automotive wing of the Polish Army in Scotland during World War II, and co-founded the first motorised brigade. He was a close associate of the celebrated General Maczek and fought alongside him in the campaign of September 1939.

The Polish 1st Armoured Division was an Allied military unit created in February 1942 at Duns. In the early stages of the war, it was stationed in Scotland and guarded 200 kms of British coastline. At its peak, it numbered c.16,000 soldiers, 380 tanks and 470 guns. Together with a motorised brigade formed in France, it contributed to the liberation of Western Europe.

After the war, the majority of its soldiers opted not to return to Soviet-occupied Poland and remained in exile, many in Scotland. General Dworak died in London on 3 September 1954.

Alas, he seems now to be largely forgotten in this country and little is known of his time in Great King Street. *Spurtle* would welcome any further details. *JRM*

Good news from **Villeneuve Wines**, whose pavement A-board announced **‘WINE DETOXES YOU*’**. Following in tiny print was a sobering qualification: **‘*WINE DOES NOT DETOX YOU’**.

In the week to 17 Jan., **no planning applications or decisions affecting Broughton** were made at all. A source suggests this may be the first complete ceasefire for 15 years.

On 17 Jan., **Leith Central Community Council** voted to back the campaign for a moratorium on **large biomass plants** in Scotland.

Broughton Primary School is girding itself for a visit by **Her Majesty’s Inspectorate of Education**. Staff – last inspected in 2002 – will at some point receive 3 weeks’ notice in which to anticipate with pleasure a process characterised by **‘transparency and mutual respect’** (according to HMIE). Parents have been asked to complete an online survey.
