

## SHRUB PLACE PLANS DRUBBED | BROUGHTON IS NEW VENUE

Locals oppose Silverfern (The Wharf) Ltd and LDC (Shrubhill) Ltd's current plans for two 120-bed hotels and groundfloor retail space at 7 Shrub Place (Ref. 09/01872/FUL).

Pilrig Residents Association and Leith Central Community Council (LCCC) objected to, among other things, the bland design and how it departed from an existing masterplan for the area, particularly in not providing a proper street off Leith Walk (a key element in the successful planning enquiry against Wimpey in 2004), and preserving the street's existing strong vista.

They pointed to an alleged oversupply of hotels in the area, and questioned the arrangements for dropping off guests once trams are operational. There was insufficient parking, they said.

In a section welcomed by *Spurtle* (Issues 169–74), LCCC also questioned the need for yet another supermarket in the area (Waitrose may be interested). How, it continued, could deliveries reach such a store without clogging narrow residential streets to the rear?

New Town and Broughton Community Council found the plans 'sketchy' and 'almost entirely devoid of architectural merit'. It questioned the necessity of losing 3 trees, and the provision of only 7 car parking spaces. It again made no comment relating to supermarkets.

LCCC reserved particular criticism for architects Hackland + Dore who, it suggested, had been given only 4 weeks to draw up the plans, had not submitted them timeously in accordance with Planning Dept Guidance, and seemed unaware of likely traffic constraints caused by the trams. With crushing generosity, LCCC remarked to CEC Planning: 'Perhaps some of the issues we outline ... might have been addressed had the Architects had the time to consult and consider these. Perhaps the Committee should view this application as an "outline" submission.'

## HOPETOUN CRESCENT GARDEN WINS NATIONAL AWARD

August, Hopetoun In Crescent Garden (HCG) laurelled with a was prestigious national award. The National Green Flag award scheme, launched in 1996, sets the benchmark against which parks and green spaces are measured, similar to the Blue Flag for beaches. Council officials and the Chairman of Friends of HCG received the award at a ceremony in Bournemouth. The award consists of a certificate

and an impressive green flag which was erected beside the recently streamlined notice boards at a celebration on 6 September.

This is a major accolade as HCG is one of only 10 winners of the award in Scotland this year. What with HCG's success, the opening of the marvellous Barony Community Garden, ongoing work in the 'greening' of George V Park by its own indefatigable Friends, not to mention the spectacular floral 'triffid' in the Mansfield Place roundabout, 2009 proves to be an *annus mirabilis* for Broughton's dear green spaces, despite the economic blues.

The B-listed property, built in 1775, has housed offices for 100+ years and was radically remodelled inside in the 1960s and '80s. The new proposal is for a 'food and wine cookery school', including function room and ancillary retail sales area.

Baffled seagulls are not raiding rubbish sacks slung by residents from railings. The new tactic started in Fettes Row, but spread across the New Town at an exponential rate reminiscent of blue tits and milk bottle tops. Quite how smelly bin bags suspended from listed properties in a World Heritage Zone are aesthetically better than wheelie-bins baffles everybody else in the city, but CEC is delighted by a rubbish solution costing nothing.

Local residents, schools, community and youth groups applying for a CEC Waste Action Grant have until 12 Oct. WAGs up to £2,500 are for local projects to reduce, reuse and recycle waste. (How about training wild animals to eat it?) CEC is trying to reach or beat a recycling rate of 42% by 2012. No date has yet been set for the **CEC** Planning Subcommittee to consider a proposed Tesco Express at 8 Picardy Place.

#### Get the P.O. out of Portobello

Mark Lazarowicz, MP is pressing Post Office officials to restore a local sorting office for the EH6, EH7 and EH8 districts.

His move follows complaints from locals who have found the switch in July from Brunswick Rd to Portobello inconvenient (Issues 173-4). The East Telferton Industrial Estate is not on a direct bus route, and is to some people a secluded and intimidating area.

Lazarowicz - who was not informed of the change in advance - has now met and corresponded with Royal Mail management. He is urging wide publicity for their promised alternative redelivery methods, and full availability of them. However, he sees the only real solution as returning 'public' facilities to the area they serve

'I would like the office to move back into an area in or at least nearer Leith and Leith Walk,' he says. 'I have urged Royal Mail to look at this possibility for the near future, even if it cannot be done immediately.'

### Full steam ahead at Glenogle

Work on refurbishment of Glenogle Baths continues on schedule and on budget, reports Linda Wilson after a site visit on 2 September.

Work has begun on tiling the pool, while new concrete slabs around its edge and at balcony level have been finished. Filtration, heating and ventilation systems costing around £1m are being put in place. Decoration of the roof was completed before scaffolding was removed. Reflectors have been attached to the roof to bounce light onto the pool from lamps attached to the columns around the balcony. Many of the windows have been reinstalled but those that were beyond repair are being replaced with custom-made ones to match the originals. External repairs to the stonework have been completed, and a However, one described the rooms as framework has been installed on the roof ready for solar panels.

### **Hostel defies Council** ban

A New Town hostel has operated throughout 2009 despite being refused retrospective planning permission in November last year.

The Bus Station Backpackers Hostel, which advertises 16 beds in the basement flat at 30a Dublin Street, caused controversy in 2008 when neighbours complained about disruption and 'free nightly pub crawls'. Owners Mr and Mrs Nicoll appealed CEC's decision this May, but may have to wait until February 2010 for a final resolution by the Scottish government. Meanwhile, the Blisted property is the subject of its third CEC enforcement notice since 2007 concerning unauthorised change of use. Officials are 'keenly interested'.

The hostel received mainly positive online reviews for its facilities and friendly atmosphere from guests who stayed there between 5 July and 4 August 2009. 'humid' and another complained that it was [a] bit difficult to find it. No notices and no lights downstairs to the main entrance door.' One website lists the hostel as having 24 beds.

# **Broughton witches and warlocks**

Four hundred years ago, Broughton Street was notorious as the haunt of alleged witches and warlocks, and as a place for their execution.

Sir Lewis Bellenden, the Baron of Broughton and Lord Justice Clerk of Edinburgh, was a noted trafficker with warlocks. The *Domestic Annals of Scotland* of 1592 record that he made a deal with Richard Graham – 'a known necromancer, and common abuser of the people' – to raise the Devil. This was done in Sir Lewis's own backyard in the Canongate, and apparently he was so terrified that 'he took sickness and thereof died'.

Accused witches were incarcerated in Broughton's old tollbooth before being strangled and burned at the stake. The foundations of this building may possibly remain in the basements of local shops.

On 1 December 1608, 3 women were put to the stake in Broughton, with the event recorded in Privy Council minutes. The Earl of Mar declared that they had been identified in Broughton as witches, had been put to an assize and convicted. The women persevered in their denial to the end, yet were burned alive in such a cruel manner that some of them 'died in despair, renouncing and blaspheming'. Some broke out of the fire, only to be cast back into it until they were burned to death. The manner of the execution caused an outcry within the city. The names of the women have been lost over time, but records held by the Scottish Witchcraft Survey show that in the same year 3 Brechin women were executed, so it may be that they had been brought to Edinburgh.

So this Halloween, when you're dookin' for apples or carving out your tumshie lantern, spare a thought for those innocents who perished – and be thankful we live in more civilised times in Broughton. FW

In a bid to curb disruption, CEC won't permit further **late-night**, **hot-food**, **carry-out shops** on Broughton and Forth Sts, Broughton St Lane, or between Picardy Place and London Rd. **Ye've hud yer chips.**

Fans of authentic **Auld Reekie** experiences have been enjoying **Rodney St**, where recent downpours brought all manner of **honking horrors** to the surface. *Spurtle* told Scottish Water, who were quickly on the job.

**Pipearrow Ltd's** application to build a 3-storey house behind 6 Baxter's Place (Issue 172) has been **refused**.

Peter Verity, a Scotland St victim of brass kickplate theft (Issue 174), reports that police have made no progress. Meanwhile, this crime-tide has risen to front doors on Regent Terrace and Calton Hill.
