Broughton puts the reek in Auld Reekie

We reported on the problem last year, remedial work was completed in January, but by mid-March the smell was back with a vengeance. **Spurtle's Alan McIntosh** has been investigating:

The stink at the corner of Mansfield Place and East London Street is set to continue.

Despite intensive investigation and repairs to the main sewerage pipe at the turn of the year, something somewhere is still leaking. The smell - it comes and it goes, but it gets up your nose - has been very obvious over the summer, affecting passersby and, especially, SCVO workers in Mansfield Traquair Centre. But Scottish Water – the body responsible for the sewerage system up to the boundaries of private properties says it has done as much as it reasonably can. It will now launch a paper investigation, searching back through written and printed records of the area for clues.

Stewart Imrey, Local Network Operator, says 'We at Scottish Water did a very thorough job of surveying the problem. We even repaired a cracked pipe that probably wasn't the source of the trouble. But we just didn't find anything obviously wrong. The cause may well lie in a trap where the pipes from some nearby tenement join the main system. That makes it a private issue which householders will have to sort out'. Scottish Water is not prepared to pay

the costs of investigating every trap in the area, and it is unlikely that the Council will stump up the funds either. Instead, Scottish Water will search its records and – only if promising leads are found – get involved again at ground, or underground, level.

Unfortunately, finding the source of the smell will not be simple. Surveyors may never find a cataract of sewage, or even a gentle trickle. A stench like this can easily originate many metres away, permeating as

dampness through the soil before coming to the surface elsewhere. Given this difficulty, and the number of parties involved, there is clear potential for stalemate here, as householders, Scottish Water and the Council all bat away responsibility in a triangular game of ping-pong.

Obviously, what's needed is coordinated action and some clear leadership. **Spurtle** says: It's time for the Broughton Village Association and Councillor Davies to step into the, erm, breach.

Invited inside, they gave a concert; and were so impressed with the hospitality that they presented the school with a plaque to commemorate their visit.

Reader Keith Cowan recently complained through his councillor about the state of repair of the pavement in Picardy Place. The pavement was duly inspected, but wasn't considered to need priority treatment on public safety grounds. This puzzles Keith as there are several paving stones that are clearly unsafe, particularly at the crossing outside The Street at the top of Broughton Street as you go over to John Lewis But on the positive side bollards to prevent traffic parking up on the pavement have been promised within the current financial year.

Last month we covered a complaint by Eric Robinson of Broughton Place about the mess caused by delays collecting rubbish bags; and Councillor Davies's comment that 'it takes two to tango' - residents need to dispose of their rubbish properly, and resistance to communal bins in the City Centre means black bags continue to attract cats, foxes and gulls. Eric was not impressed: 'I find Councillor Davies's response as arrogant as it is ignorant. With only rare exceptions, residents of Broughton Place present their refuse on the right day - IF THE RIGHT DAY IS CONSISTENT. One realises his agenda is to force the large refuse containers on residents, but even an occasional visit would indicate that, surrounded by overflow and careless disposal, they are even more vulnerable to the cats, foxes and gulls he speaks of. Pity when an elected representative fails to listen to his electors and can only respond with an ill-informed opinion'.

The top three entrants in each category of the Keep Edinburgh Growing Garden Competition have been invited to an awards ceremony on 8th September.
